UML scrutinized over business mogul's donation: rising demands for policy amendments to bar such transactions

Min Bahadur Gurung, the owner of Bhat-Bhateni Supermarket, Nepal's largest department store chain, has donated land to Nepal's communist party, CPN-UML, to build the party's central office. The party currently chairs the government. About 10 ropani 14 aana of land, which is about 0.55 hectares of land in Kirtipur, was donated to UML. Prime Minister Oli, president of UML, concealed the identity of the donor to the party members, referring to him as an altruist, but the two jointly performed rituals for commencing construction of the party's central office.

perceived as a form of indirect bribery, performed legally to advance his entrepreneurial and personal interests. In 2023, Min Bahadur Gurung was arrested on Lalita-Niwas land embezzlement case and is currently out on bail. PM Oli had strongly endorsed Gurung's innocence as the then leader of the opposition. When contextualized with the previous government's action on Gurung's VAT fraud and embezzlement of public land, this donation can be seen as an attempted political bailout.

towards the ruling party in Nepal and it has the potential to further degrade the civic perception of politics, politicians, and the democratic republican system, which is yet to set its roots firmly. Moreover, a lack of a proper legal framework prevents capitalists, and accused or convicted individuals from donating to political parties. Such deals can only lead to monopolistic practices where key decisions might favor specific individuals or companies with ill interests.
